Los Angeles's early female music makers

In 1919, when the Los Angeles Philharmonic was founded, women musicians were rarely included in major symphony orchestras. This presentation on the earliest years of the LA Philharmonic and its first three female members is meant to illustrate that this was a product of social convention rather than a lack of female musicians. There were many accomplished women involved in music, as

teachers, performers, composers and even aspiring conductors throughout the country. Women frequently performed as soloists with male orchestras, and they formed trios, quartets and even orchestras of their own. As early as 1898, Mary Wurm, a former student of Clara Schumann, founded a women's orchestra in Berlin, and served as the conductor.

Did You Know about the Disney Concert Hall?

Lillian Disney gave \$50 million in 1987 to build the Walt Disney Concert Hall.

It was completed 16 years later, in 2003 at a cost of \$274 million. Walt Disney Concert Hall was Frank Gehry's first design in this style but the Bilbao Museum in Spain was finished in 1997. Gehry's initial design plan was for the exterior to be composed of stone.

The configuration of the Hall is referred to as "vineyard" due to the



various clusters of seating. The acoustics in the Hall are the same whether it is full or empty. The stage is a series of elevators allowing for flexibility. Gehry designed the configuration of the organ pipes nicknamed French Fries.

The hall is constructed on its own foundation, separate from the rest of the building.

There are sound lock chambers between the Hall and the rest of the building.





Philharmonic Friends Campaign 2015-2016

Nominating Committee Report


The Nominating Committee for the 2016 - 2017 election of Officers and Board members was comprised of Kathy Forsman, Becky Novy and Colleen Robertson.

COPW continues to donate tickets for youth

It's not about the orchestra. It's not about the hall. It's not about the games and activities. It's about the kids, showing youngsters who are among the most vulnerable in our community that beauty still exists and the mystery of classical music is not so mysterious after all. For more than eight years, the Committee of Professional Women (COPW), an Affiliate of the Los Angeles Philharmonic has donated tickets to youngsters residing in group homes to attend a performance of the LA Phil. These half-day events are presented eight times a

year at Walt Disney Concert Hall and are a part of the LA Phil's Symphonies for Youth concerts sponsored by Toyota. The concerts are dedicated to and designed for youngsters ages five to eleven. COPW received a Gold Book Award from the League of American Orchestras for this program in 2008. Since that time, the number of tickets donated has increased 50 percent and in 2013 the program was expanded to include residents of domestic violence shelters.
