San Luis Obispo Festival Mozaic Weekend Trip

Friday, July 27—Sunday, July 29: This year's trip includes three concerts, a picnic lunch with wine tasting, two dinners and a brunch.

On Friday, we will dine at Buona Tavola, then attend a Chamber Series concert at La Cuesta College. There we will hear Mozart's String Quartet in C Minor; Connesson's Sextet for violin, viola, oboe, clarinet, bass and piano; Connesson's Techno Parade: and Bruch's Piano Quintet in G Minor.

On Saturday we will have a wine tasting and picnic lunch at the Claiborne and Churchill Vineyard. Except for one earlier club in San Francisco (remember that Gold Rush of 1849?), it would be the first women's club West of the Mississippi River!

The members voted on the Board slate for 2018/19. which was approved unanimously.

Cec introduced our guest artists: Minyoung Chang, a native of Seoul, South Korea, who came to the U.S. at age 6. She has been performing ever since. Minyoung was a gift to COPW from the LA Phil Orchestra in recognition of the work we do to support our wonderful orchestra.

She brought along 2 other LA Phil musicians; Leticia Oaks Strong who began playing violin at age four and switched to the viola at age 12. Leticia joined the LA Phil in 1994; and Mark Kashper, who was born and raised In St. Petersburg, Russia.

Mark began violin lessons at age 5. He arrived in the US in 1978 as a refugee and 3 months later won an audition to become a member of the LA Phil.

CELEBRATION OF LIFE ELAINE BERMAN

Our beloved COPW Board member and past President Elaine Berman passed away on December 8, 2017 after a long struggle with cancer. To the end of her days she lived her life with grace and dignity, with care for others, and with love for – and of – her family. A COPW member since 2001, she loved the arts, particularly music, theater, and literature, and was an avid concert-goer, theatre subscriber, and reader. Elaine grad-uated from Mount St. Mary's College with a Masters Degree in Counseling, which became her career. Giving every student the opportunity to prepare for and find a college where they could be successful became an urgent passion for her. Hundreds, perhaps thousands, of students can testify to the endless hours she spent helping students find a path to their dreams. She retired from her last position as Director of College Counseling at Wildwood School in 2007.

Elaine was dedicated to helping as many children as possible experience and learn to become musicians. She worked with all the Affiliates to provide holiday gifts for the students and encourage attendance at YO-LA concerts. At age 79 she personally coordinated a gift drive for YOLA students, arranging for several hundred presents to be purchased and, with a small committee of COPW members, wrapped and distributed. She coordinated a book drive at the June 2017 COPW Installation to stock the library at one of the YO-LA sites, and just this November led the Affiliates" effort to fund gifts for all of the YOLA students at HO-LA. Her family honored her passion by donating Elaine's Classical CD's, computer and printer to YOLA.

A lovely Celebration of Life for Elaine was held at Hotel Casa Del Mar in Santa Monica on December 30th, 2017. Many COPW members attended and past and current presidents Colleen Robertson and Annette Colfax, as well as long-time friend Susan Bell, spoke.

STREET SYMPHONY FOUNDED BY VIJAY GUPTA, L.A. PHILHARMONIC VIOLINIST

Street Symphony is a group of professional musicians, mostly from the LA Phil and Master Chorale, that work with homeless, mentally ill, and incarcerated populations. Each year they perform Handel's Messiah at the Midnight Mission, a charitable institution on Skid Row.

The son of Indian immigrants, Gupta grew up in upstate New York, After debating about a career in biology or neuroscience he turned to music full time and in 2007, at the age of 19, Gupta beat out over 300 applicants to win a seat in the LA Philharmonic first violin section.

Steve Lopez, an LA Times columnist introduced Gupta to Nathaniel Ayers, who had been a star doublebass student at Juilliard before dropping out due to schizophrenia. When they met, Ayers was living on Skid Row, where he was playing for passers-by on a broken two-stringed violin. Gupta began to give Ayers informal violin lessons. In 2008, Lopez published a book about Ayers, call "The Soloist", which later became a film.

On his 22nd birthday, Gupta was walking on Skid Row and what he saw got to him. He was soon performing at shelters, hospices, clinics and prisons. Once when performing Schumann in a mental ward at a huge jail downtown, a guy who had studied music at Cal State said to him" You know. These guys had bad things happen to them. Bach was an orphan. Beethoven was beaten by his dad. Brahms had to play in brothels. And Schumann—he died in a place like this."

In 2010, Mitch Newman, another LA Phil violinist, joined Gupta to launch Street Symphony. The performance of "The Messiah " attracts people from all over the area. Many Skid Row residents have begun to write music and perform. As he leaves the Midnight Mission after a performance, Gupta says, " The entire experience is at once exalting and crushing, luminous and bleak. We get to leave. That is the source of our shame. The only way to deal with it is to go back."

HILLSIDES



Each year, COPW provides 130 complimentary tickets for the Toyota Symphony for Youth concerts, to youngsters from six youth and family care agencies. In this way, youngsters from foster homes, homeless shelters and residential treatment facilities are provided with a unique opportunity to experience a cultural event of classical music performed by the Los Angeles Philharmonic, one of the world's outstanding orchestras, in the celebrated Walt Disney Concert Hall.

Highlighted this month is Hillsides, an agency dedicated to improving the overall well-being and functioning of vulnerable children, youth and their families. Their Family Resource Centers offer numerous community-based programs and services that provide parenting classes, mental health support and additional crucial resources for vulnerable children and families throughout Los Angeles County.

Residential Treatment Services provide a safe and stable environment where children and youths, who cannot live at home, suffered trauma or have severe emotional or behavioral challenges can thrive

The Education Center is a therapeutic residential and day school offering individualized education for students with social-emotional, learning and/behavior challenges for children in K -12th grades.

Finally, Youth Moving On provides youth formerly I foster care or probation with affordable housing and support services to help them become responsible and self-sufficient adults. Reiko Sakata

COPW was founded in 1965 by outstanding women from various businesses and professions in greater Los Angeles to encourage professional women to support the Los Angeles Philharmonic Association.

For over 50 years, COPW has carried on this mission as a community of working and retired women (and since 1999, men) who share a passion for classical music, music education and volunteerism.

COPW hosts four intimate musical events each year, held at private homes and venues throughout the Los Angeles area. In summer the committee arranges a weekend trip to a music festival, such as the Festival Mozaic in San Luis Obispo. Members enjoy volunteering as well as many "ad hoc" outings to cultural events.

COPW purchases Toyota Symphonies for Youth tickets each year and donates them to carefully selected group homes and domestic violence shelters. These enable the children to attend a concert—many for the first time. Members were honored in 2008 with the League of American Orchestras: prestigious Gold Book Award for this program. In 2012 COPW was again recognized with a Gold Book Award, this time for the committee's instrument drive for the Youth Orchestra of Los Angeles (YOLA). COPW collected many used instruments and donations that enabled purchases of 50 instruments.

PASADENA SHOWCASE HOUSE

This year's PSHA will be from Sunday April 22nd - Sunday May 20th. The house is a 1915 Mediterranean renovated in 1925. Nothing has been added since 2002. It was the Showcase house in 2002, 12,000SF and is on Altadena Drive. Parking is different this year as we're not using the Rose Bowl parking lot because of schedule conflicts. Therefore, parking will be at Santa Anita Race Track Gate 6.

*Showcase is open to the public on Friday evenings, and all Thursday nights for corporate parties.

Scheduling back to back shifts (working double shifts) is not permitted.

SH pays COPW \$40 for every shift worked and the money goes to purchase tickets to TSFY concerts for disadvantaged youth which is a very important component of COPW's mission to bring classical music to children who would otherwise never experience it, so everyone's participation is important. I am very aware that some members cannot stand for four hours. Therefore, a donation of \$40 would be very welcome and would achieve the same end. So if you cannot sign up for a shift (or as many as you like!), please consider donating the money. Please make out the check to COPW, write PSHA in the memo line and send the check to me, Sandy Beckley, at 1812 Las Flores Drive LA 90041. Your friends and family can also work shifts for COPW and that would be wonderful!

Each staffer who completes 2 staffing sessions will receive one complimentary ticket. For five or more shifts, the volunteer will receive 1 additional complimentary ticket. Community Staffers also may purchase up to 2 tickets at the members' price of \$30.00. Complimentary tickets and Member tickets have limitations on the dates and times for entry. Staffers must contact their Community Liaison (me) regarding any issues concerning their staffing shift and/or day. No credit for a shift will be given if a staffer shows up on the wrong day or time unless PSHA needs an extra staffer for that shift. Staffers must dress in an appropriate manner. Staffers must be able to easily manage stairs and uneven terrain.

Please email me (Not phone as I'd like a written record) with your requests for which day/shift(s) you would like to work. I'm gathering names now so I'll have them ready for when the computers open Thursday March 1st for staffing assignments. I'll do my best to obtain the day/shifts you requested. You also will be receiving one followup phone call from one of the kind volunteers who have signed up to assist me, for requests for shifts or donations. You of course are not required to do either a shift or donation. It would just be nice!
